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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Introduction

PRAMS, the Pregnancy Risk Assessment Monitoring System, is a comprehensive surveillance project conducted by both the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and state health departments. This survey collects state-specific, population-based data on maternal attitudes and experiences before, during, and shortly after pregnancy. PRAMS seeks to improve the health of mothers and infants by reducing adverse outcomes such as low birth weight, infant mortality and morbidity, and maternal morbidity. This report offers a detailed snapshot of Delaware's 2011 PRAMS data and should be considered as a resource for future maternal and child health project and policy initiatives.

Methods

Delaware's 2011 PRAMS data was analyzed by using IBM SPSS, Microsoft Access, and Microsoft Excel. Out of the 78 questions in the survey, 17 questions were omitted from analysis as they provided data specific to the respondent or were too complex to derive meaningful results. The remaining 61 questions were analyzed and, if necessary, adjusted so that all results were binary ("Yes" or "No"). The adjustments ultimately generated a total of 193 questions for analysis. The results for each of these questions were then stratified by five demographic categories – age of the respondent, race/ethnicity of the respondent, marital status of the respondent, whether or not the respondent had a previous live birth, and the educational status of the respondent. A set of chi-square tests was then performed to uncover whether any significant relationships existed among these five demographic categories. Finally, a weighted average scheme outlined by the CDC was implemented in order to apply the survey results to the entire 2011 Delaware PRAMS-eligible population.

Results

The age of the respondent was significantly associated with a respondent being married, having a previous live birth, and having higher educational status. In addition, White non-Hispanic respondents were more likely to be in older age groups, more likely to be married, and more likely to have more years of education completed as compared to both Black non-Hispanic and Hispanic respondents.

These differences among race/ethnicity categories permeated the overall results for the analysis of all questions. Compared to Black non-Hispanic women, White non-Hispanic women were more likely to report engaging in health promoting behaviors during the 12 months before becoming pregnant. A significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics wanted to be pregnant sooner as compared to Black non-Hispanics. Roughly one-fifth of Black non-Hispanics did not want to be pregnant; this contrasts with approximately one-tenth of White non-Hispanics. Moreover, slightly more than half of White non-Hispanics tried to get pregnant at the time they became pregnant with their new baby as compared to roughly one-fifth of Black non-Hispanics. In addition, White non-Hispanic women and women with a higher level of socioeconomic status

(as compared to Black non-Hispanic women and women with a lower level of socioeconomic status) were more likely to report breastfeeding and laying their baby down on his or her back to sleep. However, generally speaking, the percentage of White non-Hispanics consuming alcohol or using tobacco was higher than the percentage reported by Black non-Hispanics and Hispanics. As in previous PRAMS analyses, a high percentage of Hispanic women – roughly 1 in 6 – said that they did not have health insurance to help pay for prenatal care. Finally, a higher percentage of women at lower education levels and non-married women tended to report adverse social and economic support structures as compared to women at higher education levels and married women, respectively.

Conclusions

Overall, women who were married and who had more years of education had a greater level of social support as compared to non-married women and women with fewer years of education, respectively. Compared to Black non-Hispanics, White non-Hispanics generally report having a higher health status before, during, and after pregnancy with the notable exceptions of alcohol and tobacco use. As in previous PRAMS analyses, although Black non-Hispanic women (as compared to White non-Hispanic women) were more likely to report *having a discussion* with a health care provider about health promoting behaviors, such as breastfeeding, a higher percentage of White non-Hispanic women were likely to report *engaging* in these health promoting behaviors as compared to Black non-Hispanic women. Generally speaking, these, as well as the other significant associations and contrasts, should be considered when designing and modifying programs and policies aimed at improving maternal and infant health. Finally, although no direct comparisons are provided in this report, it is worth noting that the results in the 2011 PRAMS analysis tended to be more favorable across all socio-demographic categories as compared to the results in the 2008, 2009, and 2010 PRAMS analyses.

INTRODUCTION

PRAMS, the Pregnancy Risk Assessment Monitoring System, is a surveillance project conducted by both the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and state health departments. PRAMS collects state-specific, population-based data on maternal attitudes and experiences before, during, and shortly after pregnancy. The goal of the PRAMS project is to improve the health of mothers and infants by reducing adverse outcomes such as low birth weight, infant mortality, and maternal morbidity.*

PRAMS is essential for the following reasons:

- PRAMS allows the CDC and states to monitor changes in maternal and child health indicators (e.g., unintended pregnancy, prenatal care, breast-feeding, smoking, drinking, infant health);
- PRAMS provides data for state health officials to use to improve the health of mothers and infants;
- PRAMS not only provides state-specific data but also allows comparisons among participating states because the same data collection methods are used in all states.*

PRAMS provides valuable data not available from other sources about pregnancy and the first few months after birth. These data can be used to identify groups of women and infants at high risk for health problems, to monitor changes in health status, and to measure progress towards goals in improving the health of mothers and infants. PRAMS data can also be used by state agencies to identify other agencies that have important contributions to make in planning maternal and infant health programs and to develop partnerships with those agencies.*

This report offers a comprehensive snapshot of Delaware's 2011 PRAMS data and should be considered as a resource for future maternal and child health project and policy initiatives.

METHODS

The PRAMS sample of women who have had a recent live birth in 2011 were drawn from the state's birth certificate file. Each participating state samples between 1,300 and 3,400 women per year. Women from some groups are sampled at a higher rate to ensure adequate data are available in smaller but higher risk populations. In Delaware, low birthweight births are sampled at a higher rate. Selected women are first contacted by mail. If there is no response to repeated mailings, women are contacted and interviewed by telephone.* In order to reduce response bias, the CDC has set a benchmark rate of 65% as the PRAMS survey response rate. In 2011, Delaware surveyed 1,464 women between two and four months postpartum who gave birth in that year and achieved an average response rate of 72.27% (1,058 women responding).

Choosing & Retooling the Questions for Analysis

PRAMS data was analyzed using IBM SPSS, Microsoft Access, and Microsoft Excel.

Of the 78 questions in the 2011 survey, questions that provided data specific to the respondent or were too complex to derive meaningful results were omitted (Table 1).

Of the remaining 61 questions, 46 questions featured binary results (i.e., the respondent could only answer "Yes" or "No" to the question) while 15 questions offered multi-response results (i.e., the respondent could answer one option out of at least three or more options presented). Several of the binary responses had several sub-questions or sub-conditions listed; for example, question 8 requested five different binary responses based on whether or not the respondent had the certain health condition listed. Each of these sub-questions or sub-conditions was analyzed separately which ultimately brought the total number of binary questions examined from 46 to 178. To ease analysis and downstream comparisons, the 15 multi-response questions were retooled into binary responses as defined by Table 2. This resulted in 15 additional binary questions, which brought the total number of questions under investigation to 193.

Choosing Demographic Categories for Analysis

Five different demographic categories were chosen ("Age", "Ethnicity", "Married" [Marital Status], "Previous Live Birth", and "Education"). These categories were then divided into subcategories (e.g., "White non-Hispanic" for Ethnicity, "12 Years" for "Education") and the number of actual respondents for each subcategory was compared to the total number of possible respondents as given in Table 3.

Almost all of the subcategories met the 65% threshold for survey responses as shown in the "Percent Response" column. Accordingly, the sample size for each of the subcategories was considered ample to conduct robust analysis.

A cross-table comparing each of the demographic categories was then generated (Table 4) and a series of χ^2 statistical tests were performed (Table 5) to assess whether a significant relationship ($\alpha = 0.05$) occurred between demographic categories.

Not surprisingly, "Age" was significantly associated with "Married", "Previous Live Birth", and "Education" while "Married" was significantly associated with "Education". However, "Married" was not significantly associated with "Previous Live Birth".

In this population, significant associations occurred between "Ethnicity: Black NH/White NH" and all other demographic categories and significant associations also took place between "Ethnicity: Hispanic/White NH" and all other demographic categories. Based on the data and these results, White non-Hispanic respondents were more likely to be in older age groups, more likely to be married, more likely to have a previous live birth, and more likely to have more years of education completed as compared to both Black non-Hispanic and Hispanic respondents.

Putting the Ouestions & Demographic Categories Together for Analysis

To calculate results, an approach that would report what percentage of Delaware's *entire* 2011 PRAMS-eligible population would respond "Yes" to each question was implemented. To achieve this, a weighted average scheme designed by the CDC was applied to the dataset. This weighted average methodology involved performing the following steps for each of the 193 binary questions and for each of the five demographic categories ("Age", "Ethnicity", "Married", "Previous Live Birth", and "Education"):

- 1. List only the respondents who answered "Yes" to the question.
- 2. Add the designated weighted averages (field *wtanal* in the 2011 PRAMS dataset) for each of the respondents from step 1.
- 3. Divide the sum of the weighted averages from step 2 by the Delaware PRAMS-eligible population in that specific demographic category. The Delaware PRAMS-eligible population in each specific category is given in Table 6 on the following page.
- 4. Convert the fraction calculated in step 3 into a percentage. This is the weighted average response to the question (for each demographic category).

Note that some minor differences in the results may be reported here as compared to other sources. Skips and missing responses that can cause slight differences in results may be included or excluded in base calculations. For this report, they were included as a first step in PRAMS analysis. Overall, these minor differences do not change the overall discussion of the report.

For each weighted average response, a bar graph was constructed with 95% confidence intervals added. A graph for each response is given from pages 31 to 127. The 95% confidence intervals are denoted as the thin black lines spread across the end of each bar in the graph. The tables on pages 128 to 145 detail the exact percentage of "Yes" responses and the exact lower and upper bound 95% confidence intervals.

RESULTS

The following are the notable results for the weighted averages among each demographic subcategory based on careful examination of the graphs and tables. In this report, a result was considered to be statistically significant if the 95 percent confidence intervals for the percent response "Yes" for one or more of the demographic subcategories within a demographic category did not overlap one another. For example, in the results for Q1A (shown in the figure on page 31 and provided in the table on page 128), the 95 percent confidence interval for the percent of White non-Hispanics responding "Yes" (33.17%) did not overlap the 95 percent confidence interval for the percent of Black non-Hispanics responding "Yes" (21.63%). Accordingly, the difference in the average percentage of individuals in these two demographic subcategories responding "Yes" was considered statistically significant. In addition, concerns regarding small cell counts were mitigated given the relatively large sample sizes of the denominators for each demographic subcategory (Table 3). Note also that a weighted average scheme was used to generate these results, and therefore, these results reflect the entire 2011 PRAMS-eligible population in Delaware.

Pregnancy Intention & Becoming Pregnant

Pregnancy Intention

As indicated in the results to Q12A, a significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics (20.18%) wanted to be pregnant *sooner* as compared to Black non-Hispanics (7.14%) and Hispanics (5.41%). On the other hand, as indicated in Q12B, a significantly lower percentage of White non-Hispanics (28.14%) wanted to be pregnant *later* as compared to Black non-Hispanics

(46.31%) or Hispanics (39.44%). As in the 2010 Delaware PRAMS, approximately one-fifth (20.13%) of Black non-Hispanics did not want to be pregnant; this contrasts with 9.06% of White non-Hispanics and 12.17% of Hispanics (Q12D). Furthermore, as shown in Q13, a significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics (51.47%) tried to get pregnant at the time they became pregnant with their new baby, which was significantly higher than both Black non-Hispanics (22.42%) and Hispanics (40.34%). This also was the case for married women (61.35%) compared with non-married women (23.69%) and for older women and women with more years of education.

In addition, a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanics (20.01%) and Hispanics (11.00%) compared to White non-Hispanics (7.45%) thought they could not get pregnant as a reason to not do anything to keep from getting pregnant (Q15B). Similar results were also reported among women with fewer years of education as compared to women with more years of education completed. In addition, a significantly higher percentage of women under age 20 years (8.51%) had problems getting birth control when they needed it as a reason to not do anything to keep from getting pregnant (Q15D) as compared with older age groups (0.59% of women 25 to 34 years of age and 0.79% of women over 34 years of age). Moreover, as given in Q15F, a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanics (16.02%) as compared with White non-Hispanics (3.85%) responded that their husband or partner did not want to use anything (e.g., contraception) as a reason to not do anything to keep from getting pregnant. Similar results were reported among women with fewer years of education completed as compared with women with more years of education.

Becoming Pregnant

A significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics (5.72%) said "Yes" as compared with Black non-Hispanics (1.77%) and Hispanics (2.00%) when asked if they had received treatment from a doctor, nurse, or health care worker to help them become pregnant with their new baby (Q16). Similar findings occurred among married women (8.15%) as compared with non-married women (0.36%), older women (5.12% of women between 25 and 34 years of age and 10.02% of women over 34 years of age) as compared with younger women (no women ages 20 to 24 years), and women with more years of education (7.04% of women with over 12 years of education) as compared with women with fewer years of education (1.10% of women with 12 years of education). Similar results by demographic category also took place when women were asked if they used fertility-enhancing drugs prescribed by a doctor during the month they became pregnant with their new baby (Q17A) and when women were asked if they used assisted reproductive technology during the month they became pregnant with their new baby (O17C). No Black non-Hispanic, Hispanic, or women under 25 years of age claimed ever using artificial insemination or intrauterine insemination during the month they became pregnant with their new baby while 0.68% of White non-Hispanic women and 1.13% of married women stated that they did (Q17B).

Finally, a significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics (75.89%) and Hispanics (78.22%) reported being happy or very happy to be pregnant when they found out they were pregnant with their new baby as compared to Black non-Hispanics (50.79%) as shown in Q65. Compared with non-married women and women in lower age groups, a higher percentage of women that were married and in older age groups also reported being happy or very happy to be pregnant when they found out they were pregnant with their new baby.

Prenatal Care

Starting Prenatal Care

As given in Q20, a significantly higher percentage of women in older age groups responded that they received prenatal care as early in their pregnancy as they wanted as compared to women in younger age groups. Furthermore, a significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanic women (83.73%) compared to Black non-Hispanic women (78.50%) stated the same as did married women (87.62%) compared to non-married women (76.30%) and women with more years of education compared to women with fewer years of education.

Access to Prenatal Care

A significantly higher percentage of Hispanics women (6.77%) compared to non-Hispanic women said that they did not have enough money or insurance to pay for prenatal care visits (Q21B). Moreover, a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanic women (4.60%) and Hispanic women (4.48%) compared to White non-Hispanic women (2.13%) stated that they had no way to get to the clinic or doctor's office, as indicated in Q21C. A substantially higher percentage of Black non-Hispanic women compared to White non-Hispanic women responded that they could not take time off from work or school (Q21F) while a higher percentage of Hispanic women compared to non-Hispanic women asserted that they did not have their Medicaid or Diamond State Health Plan card for prenatal visits (Q21G). When compared to women with more years of education, a higher percentage of women with fewer years of education reported that they had no one to take care of their children for prenatal visits (Q21H). A markedly high percentage (20.43%) of women under age 20 years said that they didn't know they were pregnant as a reason for why they could not get prenatal care at all or as early as they wanted (Q21I). Finally, when compared with White non-Hispanics (2.62%), a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanics (4.65%) said that they did not want anyone to know they were pregnant as a problem for getting prenatal care (Q21J).

During Prenatal Care Visits

A significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanics (92.47%) compared with White non-Hispanics (81.29%) claimed that a doctor, nurse, or other health care worker talked with them during prenatal care visits about breastfeeding their baby (Q23B). Overall, compared to White non-Hispanic women and married women, a higher percentage of Black non-Hispanic women and non-married women, respectively, answered "Yes" when asked whether or not a health care provider discussed the following: how drinking alcohol during pregnancy could affect their baby

(Q23C), seat belt use during pregnancy (Q23D), how using illegal drugs could affect their baby (Q23F), the signs and symptoms of preterm labor (Q23H), what to do if labor starts early (Q23I), getting tested for HIV (Q23J), what to do if feeling depressed during pregnancy or after the baby is born (Q23K), and physical abuse to women by their husbands or partners (Q23L).

Infant Care

Breastfeeding

As given in the results to Q50, a significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics (78.57%) and Hispanics (85.06%) reported breastfeeding or pumping breast milk to feed their new baby after delivery as compared to Black non-Hispanics (72.47%). Generally speaking, a higher percentage of women with more education, that were married, or were in older age groups stated that they breastfed or pumped breast milk to feed their new baby after delivery as compared to women with fewer years of education, that were non-married, or were in lower age groups. Similar results took place for all demographic groups when women were asked whether they were still breastfeeding or feeding pumped milk to their new baby (Q51).

SIDS Prevention

A significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics (80.08%) compared to Hispanics (63.92%) and Black non-Hispanics (52.84%) reported laying their baby down on his or her back when they sleep (Q54). Compared with non-married women and women with fewer years of education, married women and women with more years of education were more likely to lay their baby down on his or her back to sleep as well. Moreover, a significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics (52.38%) reported that their baby never sleeps in the same bed/crib than themselves or anyone else as compared to Black non-Hispanics (27.19%) and Hispanics (31.51%) as indicated in Q55.

<u>Infant Survival</u>

When women were asked whether or not their baby was alive at the time of the survey (Q48), a significantly higher percentage of women under age 20 years (99.61%) responded "Yes" as compared to women over age 34 years (94.43%). Moreover, as given in Q49, a significantly higher percentage of women under age 20 years (98.27%) claimed that their baby was living with them now as compared to women over age 34 years (91.41%).

Alcohol & Tobacco Use

Alcohol Use

A significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics (78.29%) stated that they had consumed at least one alcoholic drink in the past two years as compared to Black non-Hispanics (58.40%), and in similar fashion, Black non-Hispanics compared to Hispanics (42.88%) as given in Q35. As indicated in Q36A and Q36B, the percentage of White non-Hispanics claiming alcohol use and binge alcohol consumption in the three months prior to becoming pregnant was higher than the percentage reported by Black non-Hispanics and Hispanics.

Tobacco Use

Compared to Hispanics (13.39%), a significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics (34.16%) and Black non-Hispanics (33.25%) stated that they smoked in the past two years (Q30). When asked whether or not they smoked in the past two years, a significantly higher percentage of non-married women (43.44%) said "Yes" as compared to married women (17.96%) as did women with fewer years of education (35.26% of women with less than 12 years of education) compared to women with more years of education (21.81% of women with more than 12 years of education).

As shown in Q31, the percentage of White non-Hispanics saying that they smoked at least 11 cigarettes on average each day in the three months before becoming pregnant was more than twice the percentage reported by Black non-Hispanic women (11.85% compared to 4.56%). Similar results were reported in Q32. In Q31, Q32, and Q33, non-married women and women with fewer years of education were more likely to smoke than married women and women with more years of education completed. Finally, a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanics (10.59%) stated that smoking was allowed in some rooms, sometimes, or anywhere inside their home (Q34). This contrasts with 5.58% of White non-Hispanic women.

Health Care Utilization

HIV Testing

As shown in Q24, a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanic women (84.19%) responded that they had a test for HIV at least once during their most recent pregnancy or delivery as compared to White non-Hispanic women (63.15%) or Hispanic women (65.83%). Similar results occurred between non-married women (73.48%) compared to married women (64.38%) and among younger women (69.18% of women under 20 years of age) compared to older women (58.69% of women over 34 years of age).

Childbirth Classes

In Q70A, the percentage of White non-Hispanics women reporting to have taken any childbirth classes during their most recent pregnancy was somewhat yet significantly higher than Black non-Hispanics (21.22% compared to 18.08%, respectively). A significantly higher percentage of married women (21.88%) stated that they took childbirth classes as compared to non-married women (19.54%) and women with more years of education generally reported taking childbirth classes compared with women with fewer years of education.

Dentist Visits

As indicated in Q69B, a significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics (47.18%) stated that they visited a dentist or dental clinic during their most recent pregnancy as compared to Black non-Hispanics (32.15%) or Hispanics (28.44%).

Health Status

Before Becoming Pregnant

Generally speaking, White non-Hispanic women as compared to Black non-Hispanic women were more likely to report engaging in health promoting behaviors during the 12 months before becoming pregnant. According to Q1B, 44.87% of White non-Hispanic women stated that they were exercising 3 or more days of the week; this contrasts with 34.22% of Black non-Hispanic women. In Q1H, a higher percentage of White non-Hispanic women as compared to Black non-Hispanic women (58.73% compared to 40.71%) reported that they had their teeth cleaned by a dentist or dental hygienist during the 12 months before they got pregnant. The results were mixed for health care checkups and treatments in the 12 months prior to becoming pregnant; a significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanic women compared to Black non-Hispanic women reported regular use of prescription medicines other than birth control (Q1C) and being checked or treated for depression or anxiety (Q1F) while a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanic women compared to White non-Hispanic women reported being checked or treated for diabetes (Q1D) and high blood pressure (Q1E).

With a few exceptions, no noteworthy differences exist within each demographic category in the results of whether a certain health status was present in the three months before becoming pregnant (Q8A-H). These exceptions included whether the woman had high blood pressure – a significantly higher number of Black non-Hispanics women (8.54%) stated they did as compared to White non-Hispanics (3.76%) and Hispanics (5.58%) – and whether the woman had anemia – again, a significantly higher number of Black non-Hispanics women (27.87%) stated they did as compared to White non-Hispanics (7.56%) and Hispanics (13.19%). A higher percentage of White non-Hispanic women also reported having thyroid problems (4.90%), depression (12.81%), and anxiety (20.28%) as compared to Black non-Hispanic women (2.39%, 8.72%, and 5.43%, respectively).

During Most Recent Pregnancy

As given in Q27E, a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanic women (21.60%) said that they both had a problem with high blood pressure, hypertension (including pregnancy-induced hypertension [PIH]), preeclampsia, or toxemia during their most recent pregnancy as compared to White non-Hispanic women (17.20%) or Hispanic women (8.11%). Conversely, as shown in Q27F, White non-Hispanic women reported a significantly higher percentage (13.91%) of having a problem with their placenta during their most pregnancy as compared to Black non-Hispanic women (7.83%) and Hispanic women (6.99%).

Moreover, a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanic women (16.58%) and Hispanic women (17.63%) compared to White non-Hispanic women (13.41%) stated that a doctor, nurse, or other health care worker told them to stay in bed for at least one week during their most recent pregnancy (Q28).

Finally, as shown in Q68C, a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanics reported having Chlamydia (5.57%) during their pregnancy as compared to White non-Hispanics (2.10%). As given in Q68H, a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanic women (6.92%) also stated that they had bacterial vaginosis during their pregnancy as compared to White non-Hispanics (2.04%) and Hispanics (4.14%).

Postpartum Depression

As shown in Q61A, a significantly higher percentage of non-married women (12.79%) reported always or often feeling down, depressed, or sad since their new baby was born as compared with married women (7.68%).

Health Coverage

Before Becoming Pregnant

A significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanic women (60.95%) reported to have had health insurance from a job or the job of a husband, partner, or parents just before becoming pregnant as compared to both Black non-Hispanic (34.68%) and Hispanic (25.81%) women as given in Q2A. Moreover, a significantly higher percentage of married women (75.31%) as compared with non-married women (24.01%), women with no previous live births (55.51%) compared with women with a previous live birth (46.54%), and women at higher education levels (70.63% of women with over 12 years of education) compared to women at lower education levels (34.06% of women with 12 years of education and 15.96% of women with less than 12 years of education) claimed to have had health insurance from a job or the job of a husband, partner, or parents just before becoming pregnant. For women stating to have had Medicaid or the Diamond State Health Plan prior to becoming pregnant (Q2C), the converse of the Q2A results generally occurred at each demographic category.

Prenatal Care Payer

A significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanic women (67.50%) said Medicaid paid for at least part of their prenatal care as compared to Hispanic women (51.44%) and White non-Hispanic women (35.84%) as indicated in Q22C. Similar results occurred for younger women (75.97% of women under 20 years of age) as compared to older women (28.44% of women over 34 years of age), non-married women (71.26%) compared to married women (20.86%), and women with fewer years of education compared to women with more years of education completed. For women saying that health insurance from a job or the job of a husband, partner, or parents paid for at least part of their prenatal care, the converse of the Q22C results generally took place at each demographic category as shown in Q22A. As given in Q22G, a relatively high percentage of Hispanic women – roughly 1 in 20 – said that they did not have health insurance to help pay for prenatal care.

During Most Recent Pregnancy

During their most recent pregnancy, a significantly higher percentage of younger women claimed to be on WIC (the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children) as compared to older women (Q25). Similar results were reported among women with fewer years of education (77.21% of women less than 12 years of education and 66.94% of women with 12 years of education) compared with women with more years of education (28.23% of women with over 12 years of education) and non-married women (74.91%) compared with married women (22.27%). A significantly higher percentage of Hispanic women (75.10%) were on WIC compared to Black non-Hispanics (70.40%), and in corresponding manner, a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanics compared with White non-Hispanics (33.79%). Finally, as given in Q71A, a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanics (76.60%) and Hispanics (78.29%) compared to White non-Hispanics (37.76%) stated that they were on food stamps, WIC vouchers, or received money to buy food during their most recent pregnancy.

During Delivery and Well-Baby Checkups

As shown in Q45C, a significantly higher percentage of Hispanics (75.02%) stated that Medicaid paid for at least part of the delivery as compared to Black non-Hispanics (70.31%), which in turn, was significantly higher than White non-Hispanics (37.13%). Similar results occurred for non-married women (77.80%) compared to married women (22.93%) and younger age groups (83.26% of women under 20 years of age and 78.28% of women ages 20 to 24) compared to older age groups (36.67% of women ages 25 to 34 years and 31.56% of women over 34 years of age). The converse of these results was generally reported for each of the demographic categories when women were asked whether health insurance from a job or the job of a husband, partner, or parents (Q45A) paid for at least part of their delivery. As shown in Q58A-C, similar results for race/ethnicity and education generally took place for payers of well-baby checkups and, as indicated in Q75A-H, for household income during the 12 months before birth.

Social Support

A significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics (25.16%) and Black non-Hispanics (24.40%) claimed to having a close family member who was very sick and had to go to the hospital during the 12 months before their new baby was born as compared to Hispanics (13.48%) as indicated in Q38A. In addition, as given in Q38B, a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanics (11.04%) as compared to White non-Hispanics (6.30%) stated that they became separated or divorced from their husband or partner during the 12 months before their new baby was born. As shown in Q38G, a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanic women (40.62%) as compared to White non-Hispanic women (19.07%) and Hispanic women (31.03%) stated that they had argued with their husband or partner more than usual during the 12 months before their baby was born. In addition, at 33.17%, Black non-Hispanic women were also more likely to report that they have a lot of bills they could not pay as compared to 18.83% of White non-Hispanic women and 20.16% of Hispanic women (Q38I).

Furthermore, as shown in Q72A, a significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics (81.61%) compared to Black non-Hispanics (64.32%) or Hispanics (59.16%) stated that they would know someone who could loan them \$50 if they needed it.

According to Q38D, 18.25% of Hispanic women stated that they were homeless during the 12 months before their new baby was born; this contrasts with 8.40% of Black non-Hispanic women and 2.97% of White non-Hispanic women. In addition, as given in Q38F, a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanics (15.86%) and Hispanics (18.63%) claimed that they lost their job during the 12 months before their new baby was born even though they wanted to go on working; this contrasts with 8.80% of White non-Hispanics. Overall, a higher percentage of women at lower education levels and non-married women tended to report adverse social and economic support structures as compared to women at higher education levels and married women, respectively (Q38D-L and Q72A-D).

DISCUSSION

As consistently evidenced by the Results and alluded to in the Methods section, the percentage responses for each of the questions are significantly different when stratified by demographic categories. Generally speaking, women who were in older age groups, who were married, and who had more years of education had a higher socioeconomic status (based on the indicators in the "Health Coverage" and "Social Support" sections of the Results) and health status (based on the measures in the "Health Status" section of the Results). According to the "Health Status" section of the Results, White non-Hispanics were frequently in significantly better health than Black non-Hispanics and Hispanics.

Overall, the results from the 2011 PRAMS analysis echo the results from the 2008, 2009, and 2010 PRAMS analyses. Black non-Hispanics and non-married women generally reported greater utilization of HIV testing and said that a health care provider discussed seat belt use and the risks of alcohol, smoking, and illicit drug use during pregnancy; these results may indicate success in the targeted interventions already in place throughout Delaware. On the other hand, compared to the other race/ethnicity categories, Hispanic women have stated that they could not get to a clinic or doctor's office and did not have a Medicaid card (see "Prenatal Care" and "Health Coverage" sections of the Results). Future maternal and child health programs should take this growing ethnic population into greater consideration.

Like previous PRAMS analyses, some noteworthy discrepancies were uncovered in this analysis. As in prior years, although a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanics reported that a health care provider discussed breastfeeding their baby in comparison to White non-Hispanics, a significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics reported breastfeeding or pumping breast milk to feed their new baby after delivery as compared to Black non-Hispanics (see "Infant Care" and "Prenatal Care" sections of the Results). This difference in prenatal


discussion and infant care practice may be a result of several different factors and should further be examined. In addition, the lack of consistent statistical differences between women with no Previous Live Birth and a Previous Live Birth may suggest that women do not necessarily change their behavior with the increased knowledge and experience acquired during a prior pregnancy.

Besides serving as a standardized and widely-used survey, one of the most potent features of the PRAMS survey is that it offers maternal and child health officials a window into the self-reported thoughts and behaviors of perinatal women. Moreover, PRAMS allows researchers to examine whether differences in these thoughts and behaviors exist among various socio-demographic cohorts. For example, in this analysis, about half of Black non-Hispanic women reported being happy or very happy when they found out they were pregnant; this contrasts with roughly three out of every four White non-Hispanic women. This result, combined with the reported disparities in socioeconomic supports between Black non-Hispanic and White non-Hispanic women, have been linked to the diverging perinatal outcomes between these two race/ethnicity categories. Overall, these differences in socio-demographic categories should be considered when tailoring programs and policies aimed at improving maternal and infant health at the state level.


Finally, although no direct comparisons are provided in this report, it is essential to that the results in the 2011 PRAMS analysis tended to be more encouraging across all sociodemographic categories as compared to the results in the 2008, 2009, and 2010 PRAMS analyses. This may suggest that maternal and infant health initiatives within the State of Delaware are demonstrating an effect on improving self-reported behaviors and outcomes.


Q1A: At any time during the 12 months before you got pregnant with your new baby, were you dieting (changing eating habits) to lose weight? (% "Yes")




Q1B: At any time during the 12 months before you got pregnant with your new baby, were you exercising 3 or more days of the week? (% "Yes")




Q1C: At any time during the 12 months before you got pregnant with your new baby, were you regularly taking prescription medicines other than birth control? (% "Yes")




Q1D: At any time during the 12 months before you got pregnant with your new baby, did you visit a health care worker to be checked or treated for diabetes? (% "Yes")






