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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Introduction

PRAMS, the Pregnancy Risk Assessment Monitoring System, is a comprehensive surveillance project conducted by both the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and state health departments. This survey collects state-specific, population-based data on maternal attitudes and experiences before, during, and shortly after pregnancy. PRAMS seeks to improve the health of mothers and infants by reducing adverse outcomes such as low birth weight, infant mortality and morbidity, and maternal morbidity. This report offers a detailed snapshot of Delaware's 2013 PRAMS data and should be considered as a resource for future maternal and child health project and policy initiatives. The survey year of 2013 is part of the Phase 7 survey cycle which started in 2012.

Methods

Delaware's 2013 PRAMS data was analyzed by using IBM SPSS, Microsoft Access, and Microsoft Excel. Out of 81 questions in the survey, 13 questions were omitted from analysis as they provided data specific to the respondent or were too complex to derive meaningful results. The remaining 68 questions were analyzed and, if necessary, adjusted so that all results were binary ("Yes" or "No"). The adjustments ultimately generated a total of 206 questions for analysis. The results for each of these questions were then stratified by five demographic categories – age of the respondent, race/ethnicity of the respondent, marital status of the respondent, whether or not the respondent had a previous live birth, and the educational status of the respondent. A set of chi-square tests was then performed to uncover whether any significant relationships existed among these five demographic categories. Finally, a weighted average scheme outlined by the CDC was implemented in order to apply the survey results to the entire 2013 Delaware PRAMS-eligible population.

It is essential to note that the denominators used to generate the percentages throughout this report are based on how the entire PRAMS-eligible population would have responded to the question. Therefore, the denominators - in total and stratified by age, race/ethnicity, marital status, prior live birth, educational attainment - were the same for every response presented in the report. These denominators are given in Table 6. This way of reporting differs from the method used by the CDC, in which the inclusion (or exclusion) criteria specific to each question are used to calculate the percentages. This inclusion (or exclusion) criteria are based on the flow of the questions and responses in the PRAMS survey. For example, in the PRAMS survey, if the respondent answers "No" to question 15 ("When you got pregnant with your new baby, were you trying to get pregnant?"), then the survey prompts the respondent to proceed to question 16 ("When you got pregnant with your new baby, were you or your husband or partner doing anything to keep from getting pregnant?"). If the respondent answers "Yes" to question 15, then the respondent is prompted to skip questions 16 and 17 and proceed to question 18. In this report, the entire PRAMS-eligible population (in total and stratified by the demographic categories listed above) was used for the denominators in the calculations to question 16, regardless of the response given by the respondent to question 15. However, in the method used by the CDC, only

those respondents who answered "No" to question 15 were included in the denominator calculation for question 16.

Results

The age of the respondent was significantly associated with a respondent being married, having a previous live birth, and having higher educational status. In addition, White non-Hispanic respondents were generally more likely to be in older age groups, more likely to be married, and more likely to have more years of education completed as compared to both Black non-Hispanic and Hispanic respondents.

These differences among race/ethnicity categories permeated the overall results for the analysis of all questions. Compared to Black non-Hispanic women, White non-Hispanic women were more likely to report engaging in health promoting behaviors during the 12 months before becoming pregnant. Roughly one-eighth of Black non-Hispanic women did not want to be pregnant; this contrasts with approximately one-sixteenth of White non-Hispanic women. A significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanic women wanted to be pregnant sooner as compared to Black non-Hispanic women. Moreover, slightly more than half of White non-Hispanic women tried to get pregnant at the time they became pregnant with their new baby as compared to a quarter of Black non-Hispanic women. In addition, White non-Hispanic women and women with a higher level of socioeconomic status (as compared to Black non-Hispanic women and women with a lower level of socioeconomic status) were more likely to report breastfeeding and laying their baby down on his or her back to sleep. However, generally speaking, the percentage of White non-Hispanic women consuming alcohol or using tobacco was higher than the percentage reported by Black non-Hispanic women and Hispanic women. As in previous PRAMS analyses, a high percentage of Hispanic women – about 1 in 12 – said that they did not have health insurance to help pay for prenatal care. Finally, a higher percentage of women at lower education levels and non-married women tended to report adverse social and economic support structures as compared to women at higher education levels and married women, respectively.

Conclusions

Overall, women who were married and who had more years of education had a greater level of social support as compared to non-married women and women with fewer years of education, respectively. Compared to Black non-Hispanics, White non-Hispanics generally report having a higher health status before, during, and after pregnancy with the notable exceptions of alcohol and tobacco use. As in previous PRAMS analyses, although Black non-Hispanic women (as compared to White non-Hispanic women) were more likely to report *having a discussion* with a health care provider about health promoting behaviors, such as breastfeeding, a higher percentage of White non-Hispanic women were likely to report *engaging* in these health promoting behaviors as compared to Black non-Hispanic women. Generally speaking, these, as well as the other significant associations and contrasts, should be considered when designing and

modifying programs and policies aimed at improving maternal and infant health. Finally, although no direct comparisons are provided in this report, it is worth noting that the results in the 2013 PRAMS analysis tended to be more favorable across all socio-demographic categories as compared to the results in the 2008, 2009, 2010, 2011, and 2012 PRAMS analyses.

INTRODUCTION

PRAMS, the Pregnancy Risk Assessment Monitoring System, is a surveillance project conducted by both the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and state health departments. PRAMS collects state-specific, population-based data on maternal attitudes and experiences before, during, and shortly after pregnancy. The goal of the PRAMS project is to improve the health of mothers and infants by reducing adverse outcomes such as low birth weight, infant mortality, and maternal morbidity.*

PRAMS is essential for the following reasons:

- PRAMS allows the CDC and states to monitor changes in maternal and child health indicators (e.g., unintended pregnancy, prenatal care, smoking, drinking, infant health);
- PRAMS provides data for state health officials to use to improve the health of mothers and infants;
- PRAMS not only provides state-specific data but also allows comparisons among
 participating states because the same data collection methods are used in all states.*

PRAMS provides valuable data not available from other sources about pregnancy and the first few months after birth. These data can be used to identify groups of women and infants at high risk for health problems, to monitor changes in health status, and to measure progress towards goals in improving the health of mothers and infants. PRAMS data can also be used by state agencies to identify other agencies that have important contributions to make in planning maternal and infant health programs and to develop partnerships with those agencies.*

This report offers a comprehensive snapshot of Delaware's 2013 PRAMS data and should be considered as a resource for future maternal and child health project and policy initiatives.

METHODS

The PRAMS sample of women who have had a recent live birth in 2013 were drawn from the state's birth certificate file. Each participating state samples between 1,300 and 3,400 women per year. Women from some groups are sampled at a higher rate to ensure adequate data are available in smaller but higher risk populations. In Delaware, low birthweight births are sampled at a higher rate. Selected women are first contacted by mail. If there is no response to repeated mailings, women are contacted and interviewed by telephone.* In order to reduce response bias, the CDC has set a benchmark rate of 60% as the PRAMS survey response rate. In 2013, Delaware surveyed 1,496 women between two and four months postpartum who gave birth in that year and achieved an average response rate of 67.78% (1,014 women responding).

Choosing & Retooling the Questions for Analysis

PRAMS data was analyzed using IBM SPSS, Microsoft Access, and Microsoft Excel.

Of the 81 questions in the 2013 survey, questions that provided data specific to the respondent or were too complex to derive meaningful results were omitted (Table 1).

Of the remaining 68 questions, 50 questions featured binary results (i.e., the respondent could only answer "Yes" or "No" to the question) while 18 questions offered multi-response results (i.e., the respondent could answer only one option out of at least three or more options presented). Several of the binary responses had several sub-questions or sub-conditions listed; for example, question 12 requested six different binary responses based on whether or not the respondent had the certain health condition listed. Each of these sub-questions or sub-conditions was analyzed separately, which ultimately brought the total number of binary questions examined from 50 to 187. To ease analysis and downstream comparisons, the 18 multi-response questions were retooled into binary responses as defined by Table 2.

These 18 multi-response questions resulted in 19 additional binary questions, which brought the total number of questions under investigation to 206.

Choosing Demographic Categories for Analysis

Five different demographic categories were chosen ("Age", "Ethnicity", "Married" [Marital Status], "Previous Live Birth", and "Education"). These categories were then divided into subcategories (e.g., "12 Years" for "Education") and the number of actual respondents for each subcategory was compared to the total number of possible respondents as given in Table 3.

Almost all of the subcategories met the 65% threshold for survey responses as shown in the "Percent Response" column. Accordingly, the sample size for each of the subcategories was considered ample to conduct robust analysis.

A cross-table of the demographic category was created (Table 4) and χ^2 tests were performed (Table 5) to assess whether a significant relationship ($\alpha = 0.05$) exists between categories.

Not surprisingly, "Age" was significantly associated with "Married", "Previous Live Birth", and "Education" while "Married" was significantly associated with "Education". Somewhat surprisingly, "Married" was not significantly associated with "Previous Live Birth".

In this population, significant associations occurred between "Ethnicity: Black NH/White NH" and all other demographic categories. In addition, significant associations also took place between "Ethnicity: Hispanic/White NH" and all other demographic categories except for "Age". Based on the data and these results, White non-Hispanic respondents were generally more likely to be in older age groups, more likely to be married, more likely to have a previous live birth, and more likely to have more years of education completed as compared to both Black non-Hispanic and Hispanic respondents.

Putting the Questions & Demographic Categories Together for Analysis

To calculate results, an approach that would report what percentage of Delaware's *entire* 2013 PRAMS-eligible population would respond "Yes" to each question was implemented. To achieve this, a weighted average scheme designed by the CDC was applied to the dataset. §§ This weighted average methodology involved performing the following steps for each of the 206 binary questions and for each of the five demographic categories ("Age", "Ethnicity", "Married", "Previous Live Birth", and "Education"):

- 1. List only the respondents who answered "Yes" to the question.
- 2. Add the designated weighted averages (field *wtanal* in the 2013 PRAMS dataset) for each of the respondents from step 1.
- 3. Divide the sum of the weighted averages from step 2 by the Delaware PRAMS-eligible population in that specific demographic category. The Delaware PRAMS-eligible population in each specific category is given in Table 6 on the following page.
- 4. Convert the fraction calculated in step 3 into a percentage. This is the weighted average response to the question (for each demographic category).

Note that some minor differences in the results may be reported here as compared to other sources. Skips and missing responses that can cause slight differences in results may be included or excluded in base calculations. For this report, they were included as a first step in PRAMS analysis. Overall, these minor differences do not change the overall discussion of the report.

For each weighted average response, a bar graph was constructed with 95% confidence intervals added. A graph for each response is given from pages 34 to 136. The 95% confidence intervals are denoted as the thin black lines spread across the end of each bar in the graph. The tables on pages 137 to 155 detail the exact percentage of "Yes" responses and the exact lower and upper bound 95% confidence intervals.

RESULTS

The following are the notable results for the weighted averages among each demographic subcategory based on careful examination of the graphs and tables. In this report, a result was considered to be statistically significant if the 95 percent confidence intervals for the percent response "Yes" for one or more of the demographic subcategories within a demographic category did not overlap one another. For example, in the results for Q4 (shown in the figure on page 34 and provided in the table on page 137), the 95 percent confidence interval for the percent of White non-Hispanics responding "Yes" (52.99%) did not overlap the 95 percent confidence interval for the percent of Black non-Hispanics responding "Yes" (64.84%). Accordingly, the difference in the average percentage of individuals in these two demographic subcategories responding "Yes" was considered statistically significant. In addition, concerns regarding small cell counts were mitigated given the relatively large sample sizes of the denominators for each demographic subcategory (Table 3). Note also that a weighted average scheme was used to generate these results, and therefore, these results reflect the entire 2013 PRAMS-eligible population in Delaware. Finally, the results presented here center on racial and ethnic disparities in health outcomes, behaviors, and access, all of which are of particular interest to the State of Delaware and relevant stakeholders.

Pregnancy Intention & Becoming Pregnant

Pregnancy Intention

A significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics (14.04%) wanted to be pregnant *sooner* as compared to Black non-Hispanics (6.65%) and Hispanics (10.47%) as shown in the

results to Q13B. As indicated in Q13A, however, a significantly lower percentage of White non-Hispanics (22.67%) wanted to be pregnant *later* as compared to Black non-Hispanics (30.44%) or Hispanics (32.97%). In addition, 6.52% of White non-Hispanics and 5.85% of Hispanics wanted to be pregnant; this contrasts with roughly one-eighth (12.78%) of Black non-Hispanics who did not (Q13D). Furthermore, as given in Q15, a significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics (54.23%) tried to get pregnant at the time they became pregnant with their new baby, which was significantly higher than both Black non-Hispanics (24.08%) and Hispanics (38.46%). This also was the case for married women (63.67%) compared with non-married women (25.15%) and for older women and women with more years of education.

Moreover, 17.60% of White non-Hispanics stated that they or their husband or partner were doing something to keep from getting pregnant (Q16); this was significantly lower than the corresponding percentages for Black non-Hispanics (30.46%) and Hispanics (29.77%). Despite this finding, as given in Q17B, the percentage of Black non-Hispanics who thought they could not get pregnant as a reason to not do anything to keep from getting pregnant was more than double that of White non-Hispanics (Black non-Hispanics: 14.36%; White non-Hispanics: 6.41%). For Q17B, similar results were also reported among women with fewer years of education as compared to women with more years of education completed. Furthermore, a significantly higher percentage of women under age 20 years (3.25%) had problems getting birth control when they needed it as a reason to not do anything to keep from getting pregnant (Q17D) as compared with older age groups (1.74% of women 25 to 34 years of age and 0.21% of women over 34 years of age). As presented in Q17F, a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanics (13.40%) as compared with White non-Hispanics (6.81%) and with Hispanics (4.73%) responded that their husband or partner did not want to use anything (e.g., contraception) as a reason to not do anything to keep from getting pregnant. Similar results were reported among women with fewer years of education completed as compared with women with more years of education.

Becoming Pregnant

When asked if they had taken any fertility drugs or received any medical procedures from a doctor, nurse, or health care worker to help them become pregnant with their new baby (Q18), a significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics (5.29%) said "Yes" as compared with Black non-Hispanics (1.82%) and Hispanics (0.00%). Similar findings were apparent among married women (6.34%) as compared with non-married women (1.02%), older women (4.51% of women between 25 and 34 years of age and 7.68% of women over 34 years of age) as compared with younger women (no women under age 20 years), and women with more years of education (5.93% of women with over 12 years of education) as compared with women with fewer years of education (1.07% of women with 12 years of education).

Finally, a significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics (76.87%) and Hispanics (74.39%) reported being happy or very happy to be pregnant when they found out they were

pregnant with their new baby as compared to Black non-Hispanics (46.81%) as given in Q70B. Compared with non-married women, women with lower levels of educational attainment, and women in lower age groups, a higher percentage of women that were married, with higher levels of educational attainment, and in older age groups also reported being happy or very happy to be pregnant when they found out they were pregnant with their new baby. Conversely, approximately one-seventh (14.27%) of Black non-Hispanics stated that they were very unhappy or unhappy to be pregnant with their new baby when they found out they were pregnant with their new baby; this compares to 6.59% of White non-Hispanics and 8.00% of Hispanics (Q70A).

Prenatal Care

Starting Prenatal Care

A significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanic women (82.86%) compared to Black non-Hispanic women (75.38%) and Hispanic women (77.54%) stated that they received prenatal care as early in their pregnancy as they wanted (Q21). For the same question, the percentages reported among women who were married, who had higher levels of educational attainment, and who were in older age groups were significantly higher as compared to women who were not married, who had lower levels of educational attainment, and who were in younger age groups.

Access to Prenatal Care

As shown in Q22C, a significantly higher percentage of Hispanic women (11.05%) compared to non-Hispanic women claimed that they did not have enough money or insurance to pay for prenatal care visits (Q22B). In addition, a significantly higher percentage of Hispanic women (12.26%) compared to White non-Hispanic women (2.76%) and Black non-Hispanic women (2.73%) responded that they had no way to get to the clinic or doctor's office. A substantially high percentage of Hispanic women (10.43%) stated that their doctor or health plan would not start care as early as they wanted, which kept them from getting prenatal care at all or as early as they wanted (Q22D). Moreover, a significantly higher percentage of Hispanic women compared to White non-Hispanic and Black non-Hispanic women responded that they could not take time off from work or school (O22F) or didn't have anyone to take care of their children (O22H), which kept them from getting prenatal care at all or as early as they wanted. Similar results to Q22F and Q22H occurred among women with fewer years of education (higher percentages reported) compared to women with more years of education (lower percentages reported). As compared to women in older age ranges, a significantly higher percentage of women under age 20 years said that they didn't know they were pregnant (Q22I) or didn't want anyone else to know they were pregnant (Q22J) as a reason for why they could not get prenatal care at all or as early as they wanted. Finally, a significantly higher percentage of Hispanics (11.00%) when compared with White non-Hispanics (0.21%) and Black non-Hispanics (0.11%) reported that they didn't want prenatal care as a reason for why they didn't get prenatal care at all or as early as they would have wanted (Q22K).

During Prenatal Care Visits

A significantly lower percentage of White non-Hispanics (80.08%) as compared to Black non-Hispanics (89.48%) claimed that a doctor, nurse, or other health care worker talked with them during prenatal care visits about breastfeeding their baby (Q24C). Overall, compared to White non-Hispanic women, a higher percentage of Black non-Hispanic women answered "Yes" when asked whether or not a health care provider discussed the following: how much weight you should gain during your pregnancy (Q24A), how smoking during pregnancy could affect your baby (Q24B), how drinking alcohol during pregnancy could affect your baby (Q24D), seat belt use during pregnancy (Q24E), how using illegal drugs could affect their baby (Q24G), the signs and symptoms of preterm labor (Q24I), getting tested for HIV (Q24J), what to do if feeling depressed during pregnancy or after the baby is born (Q24K), and physical abuse to women by their husbands or partners (Q24L). However, a comparable percentage of White non-Hispanic women (90.48%) and Black non-Hispanic women (88.74%) said that a doctor, nurse, or other health care worker talked with them about doing tests to screen for birth defects or diseases that run in their family (Q24H).

Generally speaking, a relatively high percentage of women overall were satisfied with aspects of their prenatal care. As presented in Q25A, an estimated 76.95% of the PRAMS-eligible population stated that they were satisfied during their prenatal care with the amount of time they had to wait after they arrived for their visits. Likewise, 84.22% of women said that they were satisfied with the amount of time the doctor, nurse, or midwife spent with them during their visits (Q25B) and 86.31% were satisfied during their prenatal care with the advice they received on how to take care of themselves (Q25C). Finally, 92.14% were satisfied with the understanding and respect that the staff showed toward them as a person (Q25D); for this question, the percentages were comparable among White non-Hispanic respondents (92.65%), Black non-Hispanic respondents (91.45%), and Hispanic (93.44%) respondents.

Infant Care

Approximately one-fifth (20.68%) of Black non-Hispanic women stated that a home visitor came to their home to help them learn about how to take care of themselves or their new baby after their new baby was born (Q59). This was significantly higher than the reported percentages of White non-Hispanics (16.64%) and Hispanics (13.81%).

Breastfeeding

A significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics (79.84%) and Hispanics (86.17%) reported breastfeeding or pumping breast milk to feed their new baby after delivery as compared to Black non-Hispanics (75.04%) as indicated in the results to Q53. Overall, a higher percentage of women with more education, that were married, or were in older age groups stated that they breastfed or pumped breast milk to feed their new baby after delivery as compared to women with fewer years of education, that were non-married, or were in lower age groups. Similar results took place for all demographic groups when women were asked whether they were still

breastfeeding or feeding pumped milk to their new baby (Q54). In fact, only 27.12% of Black non-Hispanic women stated that they were currently breastfeeding or feeding pumped milk to their new baby as compared to 46.43% of White non-Hispanic women and 45.86% of Hispanic women.

SIDS Prevention

A significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics (84.06%) and Hispanics (77.93%) compared to Black non-Hispanics (62.48%) reported laying their baby down on his or her back when they sleep (Q56). Compared with non-married women and women with fewer years of education, married women and women with more years of education were more likely to lay their baby down on his or her back to sleep as well. Moreover, a significantly lower percentage of White non-Hispanics (10.29%) and Hispanics (15.16%) reported that their baby always or often sleeps in the same bed/crib with them or anyone else as compared to Black non-Hispanics (20.67%) as indicated in Q57.

Infant Survival

As given in Q51, when women were asked whether or not their baby was alive at the time of the survey, a significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanic women (96.87%) responded "Yes" as compared to Black non-Hispanic women (95.24%). Moreover, as given in Q52, a significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanic women (96.90%) claimed that their baby was living with them now as compared to Black non-Hispanic women (94.78%).

Alcohol & Tobacco Use

Alcohol Use

A significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics (77.62%) stated that they had consumed at least one alcoholic drink in the past two years (Q41) as compared to Black non-Hispanics (63.09%), with Hispanics having the lowest percentage of alcoholic drink consumption (31.91%). As given in Q42, the percentage of White non-Hispanics claiming alcohol use and binge alcohol consumption in the three months prior to becoming pregnant was higher than the percentage reported by Black non-Hispanics and Hispanics.

Tobacco Use

Compared to Black non-Hispanics (22.93%) and Hispanics (16.25%), a significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics (36.58%) stated that they smoked in the past two years (Q36). When asked whether or not they smoked in the past two years, the percentage of non-married women responding "Yes" (42.84%) was triple that of married women (14.77%).

In addition, the percentage of White non-Hispanics saying that they smoked at least 11 cigarettes on average each day in the three months before becoming pregnant was also almost triple the percentage reported by Black non-Hispanic women (14.22% compared to 4.69%) as indicated in Q37. Similar results were reported on self-reported cigarette use in the last 3 months of

pregnancy (Q38). As given in Q37, Q38, and Q39, non-married women and women with fewer years of education were more likely to smoke than married women and women with more years of education completed.

Health Care Utilization

HIV Testing

As presented in Q26, a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanic women (86.45%) stated that they had a test for HIV at least once during their most recent pregnancy or delivery as compared to White non-Hispanic women (58.08%) or Hispanic women (78.31%). Similar results occurred between non-married women (80.68%) compared to married women (56.35%).

Flu Shots

Approximately three out of four women (76.75%) of women reported that a doctor, nurse, or other health care worker offered them a flu shot or told them to get one during the 12 months before delivery of their new baby (Q27).

Childbirth Classes

A higher percentage of married women (21.13%) stated that they took childbirth classes as compared to non-married women (13.85%) and women with more years of education generally reported taking childbirth classes compared with women with fewer years of education (Q31).

Dentist Visits

As indicated in Q30A, 86.59% stated that they knew it was important to care for their teeth and gums during pregnancy (Q30A). Furthermore, approximately half (47.38%) said that a dental or other health care worker talked with them about how to care for their teeth and gums (Q30B). For these two questions, the percentages reported by race/ethnicity, age, marital status, and educational attainment were roughly the same. However, as indicated in Q30C, a significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics (46.42%) claimed that they had their teeth cleaned by a dentist or dental hygienist during their most recent pregnancy as compared to Black non-Hispanics (32.63%) or Hispanics (37.09%). Moreover, as shown in Q30D, 60.78% of White non-Hispanics had insurance to cover dental care during their pregnancy, which was significantly higher than Black non-Hispanics (50.93%) and almost triple that of Hispanics (22.90%). Finally, a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanics (Q30E). However, the percentage of Black non-Hispanics who reported *actually* going to a dentist or dental clinic about a problem was comparable to both White non-Hispanics and Hispanics (Q30F).

Health Status

Before Becoming Pregnant

Overall, White non-Hispanic women as compared to Black non-Hispanic women were more likely to report engaging in health promoting behaviors during the 12 months before becoming

pregnant. According to Q7B, 46.17% of White non-Hispanic women stated that they were exercising 3 or more days of the week; this contrasts with 33.76% of Black non-Hispanic women and 42.36% of Hispanic women. In Q7H, a higher percentage of White non-Hispanic women (57.99%) as compared to Black non-Hispanic women (44.49%) and Hispanic women (36.31%) reported that they had their teeth cleaned by a dentist or dental hygienist during the 12 months before they got pregnant. The results were mixed for health care checkups and treatments in the 12 months prior to becoming pregnant; a significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanic women compared to Black non-Hispanic women reported regular use of prescription medicines other than birth control (Q7C) while a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanic women compared to White non-Hispanic women reported being checked or treated for diabetes (Q7D) and high blood pressure (Q7E).

As provided in Q9, slightly less than half (47.99%) of White non-Hispanic women stated that they took a multivitamin or prenatal vitamin at least once a week during the month before they became pregnant with their new baby. This percentage was significantly higher than that reported by Black non-Hispanic women (27.35%) and Hispanic women (29.28%).

Furthermore, the race/ethnicity categories differed in the reported presence of adverse health conditions before getting pregnant (Q11A-C) or in the three months before becoming pregnant (Q12A-F). In Q12A, 16.10% of Black non-Hispanics stated they had asthma as compared to 13.07% of White non-Hispanics and 6.29% of Hispanics. Similar disparities, in which the percentages reported by Black non-Hispanics were higher than White non-Hispanics and Hispanics, were apparent for high blood pressure or hypertension (Q11B) and anemia (Q12B). Conversely, a higher percentage of White non-Hispanic women reported having depression (Q11C) and anxiety (Q12F) as compared to Black non-Hispanic and Hispanic women.

During Most Recent Pregnancy

In Q34, 6.12% of White non-Hispanic women and 7.28% of Black non-Hispanic women reported that a doctor, nurse, or other health care worker told them that they had gestational diabetes; these percentages were significantly lower than the percentage reported by Hispanic women (23.23%). A markedly high percentage (27.12%) of Black non-Hispanic women stated that they had a problem with severe nausea, vomiting, or dehydration during their most recent pregnancy; this contrasts with only 16.32% of White non-Hispanic women and 14.72% of Hispanic women (Q35C). Compared to White non-Hispanic women and Hispanic women, a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanic women also had a problem with incompetent cervix (Q35D), high blood pressure or hypertension (Q35E), and labor pains more than 3 weeks before their baby was due (Q35G).

A higher percentage of Black non-Hispanic women (6.53%) as compared to White non-Hispanic women (2.77%) and Hispanic women (2.75%) stated that their husband or partner pushed, hit, slapped, kicked, or physically hurt them during their most recent pregnancy (Q46).

As presented in Q74C, a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanics reported having Chlamydia (6.66%) during their pregnancy as compared to White non-Hispanics (2.48%) and Hispanics (2.02%). In Q74H, a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanic women (9.78%) also stated that they had bacterial vaginosis during their pregnancy as compared to White non-Hispanic women (5.68%) and Hispanic women (2.08%).

Postpartum Depression

A significantly higher percentage of non-married women (8.04%) stated that they always or often felt down, depressed, or sad since their new baby was born as compared with married women (3.15%) as given in Q64. Similar results were reported in Q65, in which respondents were asked if they have always or often felt little interest or little pleasure in doing things since their new baby was born.

Health Coverage

Before Becoming Pregnant

The race/ethnicity groups differed in their self-reported health insurance status prior to becoming pregnant. Compared to Black non-Hispanic (32.90%) and Hispanic (15.40%) women, a significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanic women (59.55%) stated that they were covered by private insurance during the month before getting pregnant with their new baby (Q8A). Conversely, the percentage of Black non-Hispanic women who were covered by Medicaid during the month before they got pregnant with their new baby was more than double that of White non-Hispanic women (Black non-Hispanic: 61.28%; White non-Hispanic: 23.41%) as presented in Q8C. Finally, compared to the other two race/ethnicity groups, a relatively high percentage of Hispanic women (17.98%) stated that they were covered by CHAP (Community Healthcare Access Program) during the month before they got pregnant with their new baby (Q8E); furthermore, a high percentage of Hispanic women (31.88%) claimed that they did not have any health insurance during the month before they became pregnant (Q8G).

Prenatal Care Payer

A significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanic women (77.98%) said Medicaid paid for at least part of their prenatal care as compared to Hispanic women (55.25%) and White non-Hispanic women (39.16%) as indicated in Q23C. Similar results occurred for younger women (83.95% of women under 20 years of age) as compared to older women (28.33% of women over 34 years of age), non-married women (79.65%) compared to married women (22.92%), and women with fewer years of education compared to women with more years of education completed. For women saying that health insurance from a job or the job of a husband, partner, or parents paid for at least part of their prenatal care, the converse of the Q23C results generally took place at each demographic category as shown in Q23A. Compared to the other race/ethnicity groups, a relatively high percentage of Hispanic respondents said that the Delaware Healthy Children Program (Q23D: 4.66%) or Community Healthcare Access Program (Q23E: 27.16%) helped pay for their prenatal care. As given in Q23G, a relatively high

percentage of Hispanic women (7.13%) said that they did not have health insurance to help pay for prenatal care.

During Most Recent Pregnancy

During their most recent pregnancy, a significantly higher percentage of younger women claimed to be on WIC (the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children) as compared to older women (Q33). Similar results were reported among women with fewer years of education (73.33% of women less than 12 years of education and 67.47% of women with 12 years of education) compared with women with more years of education (28.91% of women with over 12 years of education) and non-married women (70.48%) compared with married women (23.69%). A significantly higher percentage of Hispanic women (77.30%) were on WIC compared to Black non-Hispanics (69.56%), and in corresponding manner, a significantly lower percentage of White non-Hispanics (29.49%). Finally, as given in Q75A, a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanics (81.81%) and Hispanics (80.25%) compared to White non-Hispanics (36.94%) reported that they were on food stamps, WIC vouchers, or received money to buy food during their most recent pregnancy.

During Delivery and Well-Baby Checkups

As provided in Q66C, a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanics (74.65%) stated that Medicaid is currently their health insurance as compared to White non-Hispanics (37.80%) and Hispanics (44.88%). Similar results occurred for non-married women (77.39%) compared to married women (19.38%) and younger age groups (91.18% of women under 20 years of age and 70.92% of women ages 20 to 24) compared to older age groups (39.15% of women ages 25 to 34 years and 25.97% of women over 34 years of age). The converse of these results was generally reported for each of the demographic categories when women were asked whether health insurance from a job or the job of a husband, partner, or parents (Q66A) is currently their health insurance. Compared to the other two race/ethnicity groups, a relatively high percentage of Hispanic respondents said that the Community Healthcare Access Program (Q66E: 24.31%) is their current form of health insurance. Finally, an estimated 1 in 6 Hispanic women were reported as not having health insurance now (Q66G).

Across all socio-demographic categories assessed, approximately 7 out of 8 women reported having had a postpartum checkup since their new baby was born (Q63).

Social Support

A significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics (26.91%) and Black non-Hispanics (32.16%) claimed to have a close family member who was very sick and had to go to the hospital during the 12 months before their new baby was born as compared to Hispanics (13.52%) as given in Q44A. In addition, as shown in Q44B, a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanics (15.07%) as compared to White non-Hispanics (6.77%) and Hispanics (7.27%) stated that they became separated or divorced from their husband or partner during the 12 months

before their new baby was born. A significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanic women (36.04%) as compared to White non-Hispanic women (22.26%) and Hispanic women (16.97%) stated that they had argued with their husband or partner more than usual during the 12 months before their baby was born (Q44I). Furthermore, as provided by Q44J, the percentage of Black non-Hispanic women who stated that their husband or partner said that they didn't want them to be pregnant (16.31%) was slightly more than double that of White non-Hispanics (7.24%). Finally, as shown in Q76A, a significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics (83.87%) compared to Black non-Hispanics (61.83%) or Hispanics (59.72%) stated that they would know someone who could loan them \$50 if they needed it.

According to Q44D, 6.69% of Black non-Hispanic women reported that they were homeless during the 12 months before their new baby was born; this contrasts with 1.50% of White non-Hispanic women and 0.93% of Hispanic women. Overall, a higher percentage of women at lower education levels and non-married women tended to report adverse social and economic support structures as compared to women at higher education levels and married women, respectively (Q44A-N and Q76A-D).

DISCUSSION

As consistently evidenced by the Results and alluded to in the Methods section, the percentage responses for each of the questions are significantly different when stratified by demographic categories. Overall, women who were in older age groups, who were married, and who had more years of education had a higher socioeconomic status (based on the indicators in the "Health Coverage" and "Social Support" sections of the Results) and health status (based on the measures in the "Health Status" section of the Results). According to the "Health Status" section of the Results, White non-Hispanics were frequently in significantly better health than Black non-Hispanics and Hispanics.

Generally speaking, the results from the 2013 PRAMS analysis echo the results from the 2008, 2009, 2010, and especially, the 2011 and 2012 PRAMS analyses. Black non-Hispanics and non-married women generally reported greater utilization of HIV testing and said that a health care provider discussed seat belt use and the risks of alcohol, smoking, and illicit drug use during pregnancy; these results may indicate success in the targeted interventions already in place throughout Delaware. On the other hand, compared to the other race/ethnicity categories, Hispanic women were less likely to have health insurance throughout the perinatal period (see "Prenatal Care" and "Health Coverage" sections of the Results). Future maternal and child health programs should take this growing ethnic population into greater consideration.

Like previous PRAMS analyses, some noteworthy discrepancies were uncovered in this analysis. As in prior years, although a significantly higher percentage of Black non-Hispanics reported that a health care provider discussed breastfeeding their baby in comparison to White non-


Hispanics, a significantly higher percentage of White non-Hispanics reported breastfeeding or pumping breast milk to feed their new baby after delivery as compared to Black non-Hispanics (see "Infant Care" and "Prenatal Care" sections of the Results). This difference in prenatal discussion and infant care practice may be a result of several different factors and should further be examined. In addition, the general lack of consistent statistical differences between women with no Previous Live Birth and a Previous Live Birth may suggest that women do not necessarily change their behavior with the increased knowledge and experience acquired during a prior pregnancy.

Besides serving as a standardized and widely-used survey, one of the most potent features of the PRAMS survey is that it offers maternal and child health officials a window into the self-reported thoughts and behaviors of perinatal women. Moreover, PRAMS allows researchers to examine whether differences in these thoughts and behaviors exist among various socio-demographic cohorts. For example, in this analysis, about half of Black non-Hispanic women reported being happy or very happy when they found out they were pregnant; this contrasts with three out of every four White non-Hispanic women. This result, combined with the reported disparities in socioeconomic supports between Black non-Hispanic and White non-Hispanic women, have been linked to the diverging perinatal outcomes between these two race/ethnicity categories. Overall, these differences in socio-demographic categories should be considered when tailoring programs and policies aimed at improving maternal and infant health at the state level.


Finally, although no direct comparisons are provided in this report, it is essential to note that the results in the 2013 PRAMS analysis tended to be more encouraging across all sociodemographic categories as compared to the results in the previous PRAMS analyses. This may suggest that maternal and infant health initiatives within the State of Delaware are demonstrating an effect on improving self-reported behaviors and outcomes.

Q4: Before you got pregnant, did you have any other babies who were born alive?***,††† (% "Yes")




Q5: Did the baby born just before your new one weigh less than 5 pounds, 8 ounces (2.5 kg) at birth?***,††† (% "Yes")






Q6: Was the baby just before your new one born earlier than 3 weeks before his or her due date?***,††† (% "Yes")




Q7A: At any time during the 12 months before you got pregnant with your new baby, were you dieting (changing eating habits) to lose weight? (% "Yes")




Q7B: At any time during the 12 months before you got pregnant with your new baby, were you exercising 3 or more days of the week? (% "Yes")




Q7C: At any time during the 12 months before you got pregnant with your new baby, were you regularly taking prescription medicines other than birth control? (% "Yes")




Q7D: At any time during the 12 months before you got pregnant with your new baby, did you visit a health care worker to be checked for diabetes? (% "Yes")
















































































