SELF-DIRECTED ATTENDANT CARE FOR CHILDREN



SELF DIRECTED ATTENDANT CARE FOR CHILDREN

- Effective January 1, 2023, Delaware Medicaid began providing coverage of Self-Directed Attendant Care (SDAC) for children receiving personal care services.
- SDAC includes assistance with Activities of Daily Living (ADLs) and Instrumental Activities of Daily Living (IADLs).
- Self-direction allows a parent/guardian or other representative designated by the parent/guardian to direct this service on behalf of their child.
- To qualify for SDAC, a child must have a complex medical condition, Intellectual/Developmental Disability, or a behavioral health condition.
 - The condition must result in the need for assistance with ADLs and IADLs.



SDAC (CONTINUED)

- A legally responsible family member, family member, neighbor, or friend can be hired to provide personal care services.
- The family can choose the service provider as long as the individual meets all employee qualifications.
- Legally responsible family members who provide SDAC must designate another family member/representative to be responsible for directing care and approving time sheets.
- Legally responsible family members are limited to providing 40 hours a week of care.





MEDICAID PEDIATRIC RESPITE



RESPITE FOR CHILDREN

- The Medicaid Pediatric Respite benefit is for individuals up to age 21 who are not receiving respite through PROMISE or the Lifespan 1915c waiver (i.e., Division of Developmental Disabilities Services [DDDS]).
 - As of January 1, 2023, the Delaware Department of Education no longer provides these respite services.
 - Children eligible for DDDS respite (i.e., not Lifespan) and Medicaid respite must get respite through Medicaid.
- Respite services are on a short-term basis to allow temporary relief from caretaking duties for the child's primary unpaid caregiver, parent, court-appointed guardian, or foster parent.
- Medicaid pediatric respite is for caregivers of children and adolescents who have a physical health or behavioral health condition, including Autism Spectrum Disorder or an Intellectual Disability.
- Families have the option to self-direct Medicaid respite services.
- Children must be enrolled in Medicaid and with a managed care organization (MCO) to receive Medicaid pediatric respite services.
- Families interested in Medicaid respite should talk with their MCO care coordinator.



RESPITE (CONTINUED)

- Types of Medicaid Respite:
 - In-home unskilled respite
 - In-home skilled respite
 - Out-of-home respite
 - Emergency respite
- Medicaid Respite for children is limited to 15 days or 285 hours per waiver year (emergency respite is not included in the benefit limit).
- Respite providers must meet minimum qualifications.
- Families should communicate with their MCO care coordinator regarding approval for Medicaid respite and tracking respite hours.

SDAC PROVIDER QUALIFICATIONS

- SDAC providers must meet all qualifications as verified by the MCO:
 - Be at least 18 years old.
 - Have the skills necessary to perform the required service.
 - Have a valid social security number.
 - Be willing to complete a criminal record check.
